bundled up they were often unrecognizable but as usual horses were recognized first! Several new types of warming devices were used by riders--toe warmers are great, but you need to follow the directions and manipulate them to expose them to air! If you stick them to your sock and immediately thrust your foot in your boot they do not warm well. James Corgill suggested boot insoles that are charged and then placed in your boots. Lynane Plumlee had Hot Sockee by TraxFactory, a sleeve that fits over your toes. Shirley Tarrillion suggested multiple layers for your feet, two or even three pairs of socks. Layers were extremely important, and wool was helpful as well. Dinner was lasagna with sides and desserts provided by members. Sunday, thankfully, was warmer and sunny with light winds, a much more enjoyable ride. So many board members, judges, and senior judges were helping at obstacles. I was really tickled when Greg Dial, Judges Director, was reading directions as a "volunteer" at obstacle 1. Senior Judge Kelly Beard was also a "volunteer" as she watched her granddaughter Halle ride by on Joe (she is 13 and placed 2nd on Sunday in the ADULT maverick division). Karen Pantel, Ride Director, was judging and Tiffany Janke, Treasurer, was riding and assisting her mom Rhonda who was secretary. Bill Phillips, Acting President:



Not only did TTCC celebrate the Yuletide season in great fun and style at our annual Christmas Ride and Fundraiser, but your judges attended a forum of discussion and demonstration the next day. Much of what we covered were "housekeeping" issues: procedures, clarifications, and reminders. But several areas revolved around safety and scoring, and those will directly affect you as riders. Those areas are:

Ground Tie

A proper ground tie demonstrates the horse's willingness to stand still on command after the rider leaves his/her side. In the past, we've specified that any rein must be looped over the horse's neck, and not over the saddle horn to avoid artificially restricting the horse's ability to move. With equipment involving a loop rein (English bridles, roping or barrel reins, mecáte reins, or romal), this creates a safety hazard if the horse drops his head and steps into the loop. To avoid this, any rein may be laid over the saddle horn or a rein extender secured to the saddle, **provided that there is no tension in the rein to prevent the horse's movement.** A horse seen to be "testing" the rein in a ground tie and thereby checking his movement will be scored as an improper or incomplete ground tie. A rein (lead rope, etc,) touching the ground is preferred but NOT required.

Foot out of stirrup

Unless specified for the obstacle, a rider removing a foot from a stirrup to effect greater cueing will result in a point deduction to the rider.

Use of artificial aids

Use of sticks, flags, or treats to elicit a specific movement or behavior for a specific obstacle will result in a point deduction to the rider.

Second/third attempts

A reminder that scoring for a second attempt starts at "8"; for a third attempt, scoring starts at "7". For clarification, an "attempt" is not a complete do-over, but a re-start from the point where the judge perceived the execution was in error.

Endangerment of staff

Although they are few, we have had instances of horses nipping a volunteer, and at least one of a horse kicking out at or knocking a volunteer off their feet. A horse/rider team that directly endangers staff at an obstacle will receive a score of "0" and be dismissed from the obstacle. Repeat offenders may be asked to leave the ride.

Tailing

The purpose of "tailing" is to assist a dismounted rider in walking up a hill. In the interests of control and safety, the lead rope used should **NOT** be run through a stirrup, should **NOT** fall below the level of the stirrup, and should **NOT** touch the ground.

Tailing per division:

- → Horseman—Rider positioned behind horse's hip, grasping tail hair below the tail bone;
- → Maverick—Rider positioned at horse's hip, grasping cantle of saddle;
- → Tenderfoot—Rider positioned at horse's side, grasping stirrup, horn, or breast collar.

December 11,2023 BOD Meeting Summary

- BOD approved a max attendance limit of 150 for the Celebration Event
- The 2024 TTCC patch has been ordered
- Final preparations for the Silent Auction/Celebration Event are being made
- The Christmas Fund Raiser event trail will be 6.2 miles long and all obstacles have been designed and are ready to set up
- The 2024 Youth/Rider clinic was discussed, and Alex McStay will be the appointed chair of the youth clinic
- Additional changes to the 2024 Rulebook per below:
 - o 1.2.2 add "has competed at Horseman Level"
 - 1.2.6 form additional paragraph with wording of "failure to attend
 a Judge's Roundtable/Clinic/Meeting, will result in a judge being moved to inactive status"
 - o 2.6 add language "all riders must sign/complete forms from all venues"
 - o 4.1 c edit/add: "Accomplished equine and rider team, and horsemanship professionals"
 - 4.1 c add addendum to read: "A horsemanship professional is defined as anyone who offers training, lessons, clinics, or media to the public for monetary compensation. Instructors whose sole function is safety in a therapeutic riding program, instructors who work only in a classroom setting, camp counselors, and facilitators in EAL or EAP scenarios are excepted"



- Discussion was had pertaining to an idea brought before the Board about the club providing horseback services
 to direct traffic and assist in parking vehicles for events held at the Cadence Bank Center (formerly the Bell
 County Expo Center). The intent of this idea was to be a possible fund raiser for TTCC, but the Board decided to
 not support this suggestion due to the club's insurance limitations, availability of members to work such events,
 and conflicts with TTCC ride dates
- The December Christmas Fund Raiser event brought in approximately \$1,600
- The Judge's forum held on December 17, 2023 was attended by 15 judges.
- A process of how to better account for volunteers at rides was discussed, as well as a process of how to track Iron Riders. Minimal changes to the registration at rides (that will impact the Ride Secretary) may be implemented

For 2024 TTCC ride events, Ride Managers will be charged \$100 for the weekend to help cover the costs of insurance and ribbons. The cost of ribbons and insurance for 2024 is approximately \$3,200.

The 2024 Ride Managers Manual will be sent to all Ride Managers by the end of February.
