DO YOU RIDE LIKE A JUDGE IS WATCHING?

Have you gotten a little complacent when you ride? It can be a big mistake when you are working with an animal that usually weighs over a thousand pounds and has much quicker responses than a human.

I try to ride the same way every time, whether it is a 30-minute ride in the pasture, or a five-hour judged trail ride. The skills we have learned and the tools that are required for competitive trail are important. During competition we are required to have a halter, lead rope, knife, hoof pick, and trail map. I have found EVERY one of these items to be useful and now I carry them EVERY time I ride. I add a charged phone, water, and a saddle bag packed with a few extras.

In addition to these tools, there are many skills that my horse and I have learned. I remember when I first started as a Tenderfoot and I approached a side pass obstacle. I would tell the judge that we would try but neither I, nor my horse, had ever side passed. Well, we learned, took some lessons, attended clinics, and practiced. The relationship between myself and my horse grew, and we improved!

Finally, we have ridden a lot of miles. We have practiced in many different circumstances, varied terrain, by ourselves or in a group, in the arena, on the trail, down the street, at night, and in all kinds of weather. The point is not to win a blue ribbon, although that is fun, but to become a confident horse and rider team. And to develop the trust between horse and rider that comes from lots of riding in many situations.

TRAINING TIPS by Greg Dial

"The Power of Three" (No math involved)

Is this you at a lesson?

Coach: "What do you want to work on today?"

Rider: "Everything"

It's easy to get caught up in trying to train everything at once. But for many riders, "3" seems to be the sweet spot. For instance:

- Break down a maneuver into its three smallest parts and work those
- Find a three-beat rhythm to execute a movement
- Hold a cue for a count of three before adding pressure

- Determine what three skill sets need your greatest attention
- Look for three takeaways from a clinic session or a lesson
- Execute a newly-learned skill three times to cement the muscle memory
- Plan three areas to concentrate on when you practice
- Try to find three gears within any given gait
- Have three clear levels of pressure to escalate a cue

...and there are many more.

Examples:

- Break down a rollback--1) Stop; 2) Turnaround; 3) Lope departure. Then break each element down into threes again.
- Rhythm for a sidepass--Cue-step-step (waltz time)
- Cue escalation--Ask, Tell, Command
- Cue pressure timing--hold for a count of 3 at each level
- Gait gears--Working, Extended, Engaged
- Skill sets--As mentioned last time, evaluate your three lowest scoring obstacles from a given ride and concentrate your efforts on those

For some reason, three seems to make sense to most horses, and three is usually what we can remember later. It's also an easy "waltzing" rhythm that swings along and can help carry you through more complex maneuvers. And if you count out loud, it'll help you remember to breathe!

December 2024 BOD Meeting Minutes (summary):

- Called to approve the November 2024 BOD Minutes. Approved by all.
- Changes to the 2025 Rules and By-Laws need to be discussed/changed in order for the new Rulebooks to be sent to the printer and have back before Celebration.
- The transition to Carin Bauer as the newly elected President will take effect 1/1/2025. Bill will still oversee and MC the Celebration event since it was his tenure in 2024.
- Greg discussed options for the caterer. Options were from Olive Garden & Little Italy out of Killeen.
 The main dish of chicken parmesan was the menu choice, but Little Italy gave a better price. Karen
 made a motion to accept the quote from Little Italy with a \$15/per person charge for the meal.
 Seconded by Bill and approved by all.
- The Judge's Meeting held on 12/1/2024 was attended by 15 judges and there was a lot of good discussion and clarification on issues. It will be mandatory for any judges who did not attend this meeting to get with Greg to discuss any changes to the judge's rules/expectations, etc.
- Senior Judge meeting was held on January 26, 2025 and was attended by 6 senior judges.
- Tiffany took an inventory of paper goods left over from last year's Celebration event, and determined that plates, etc. need to be ordered. Permission was given to go ahead and order needed supplies.
- Membership Director submitted two months of member highlights for the future Newsletters.
- Mary Ann received the invoice for 2025 patches and will send a mock up to the Board before final go ahead to produce the patches.
- Has been working with Katherine Mason on updating membership & sponsor information for the Rulebook. Just waiting on any updates to the rules.
- The 2025 Membership Applications and Liability Releases have been printed and ready for the 2025 rides.
- Ride Director Ride Manager Manual will be sent out before 2/1/25 to all 2025 RM's
- Ride Managers Instead of a \$175 cost for ribbons & liability insurance for 2025 rides, the cost has been decreased to \$150 since one more ride was added to the calendar.

January 2025 BOD Meeting Minutes (summary)

• Called to approve the December 2024 BOD Minutes. Greg made the motion; 2nd by Tiffany and approved by all.

Old Business:

• Discussion of upcoming Celebration event began with Bill Phillips since he was 2024 President. All BOD members mentioned his/her responsibilities.

New Business:

- Carin's new business: Discussion of the club's tax status 501(c)(7). Bill spoke up saying he thought that TTCC was a not for profit and Greg thought we were a 501 (c)(4) type. Much discussion was had and the consensus was to possibly have a CPA research our club's mission/purpose and determine which type according to IRS fits our club.
- Carin wants to form a By-law committee to review the current TTCC by-laws, specifically the language concerning the election cycle for President/Treasurer; donations received by Cadence Bank (parking fundraiser); grievance process; a process for handling money & property owned by TTCC in the event the club is dissolved. Carin suggested to form a committee now and have suggestions ready to present at the Spring General Meeting to be held in conjunction with the Great Train Robbery ride (April 12/13).

Discussion was had suggesting to form a committee and gather thoughts and ideas to be approved by the BOD and added to the Fall ballot for vote by the complete membership. **A motion was made by Carin to solicit volunteers for a by-law committee; 2nd by Greg and approved by all with the understanding that committee members must be discussed and approved by the BOD.** It was also understood that the newly formed by-law committee gather suggestions to present to the BOD for approval to be placed on the 2025 Fall ballot. Greg suggested that the by-law committee include at least 2 current BOD members and possibly three members that are in good standing with TTCC.

- Another subject presented by Carin is for the BOD become a role model for healing.
- Greg discussed the Spring youth and rider clinics. The schedule will mimic the past clinic schedules. He also mentioned that he has in place the number of judges and helpers needed to make the clinics very successful.
- In light of a member claiming they never received their mileage concho from a previous awards ceremony, Karen presented the idea to have all future recipients of mileage awards sign/initial for such.
- With another ride added to the 2025 calendar, Karen discussed having the amount reduced from \$175 (original amount approved by BOD) to \$150 for liability insurance and ribbon costs. Motion made by Karen; 2nd by Greg; approved by all.
- Tiffany will send out the projected budget for 2025 to the BOD by email.
- Mary Ann (Membership Director) mentioned that the 2025 Rulebook/Directory is at the printer and will be ready for distribution at Celebration. A total of 150 books were printed. Also, the 2025 patches are in and ready to be handed out to all members.
- Mary Ann plans to make packages for all Ride Secretaries that will include membership applications, liability releases, patches, rulebooks, etc.
